ACOUSTIC GUITAR RECORDING

Whether your acoustic guitar is nylon or steel string, six or 12-string, Yamaha or Maton, understanding how to record your weapon of choice can provide a truly amazing end product. Let's explore.

MICROPHONE CHOICE

In earlier issues, we looked at the Dynamic and Condenser microphones, with dynamic microphones being a sturdy and rugged type, capable of handling almost any type of recording situation, and condenser microphones being a highly sensitive type, with very accurate attention to detail. The condenser microphone would definitely be the recommended type for this recording situation.

MICROPHONE PLACEMENT

Positioning a microphone toward the sound hole of the acoustic guitar will pick up a great amount of the body tone from

the guitar, providing a warmer and fuller sound for the recording. Any strumming or finger picking will also be picked up in detail this way. Position the microphone between the 12th fret and the sound hole; try about six to eight inches away from the actual body. Listening through headphones whilst positioning your microphone is a great tip, as you can actually hear the difference as you move closer and further from the sound source. The closer you get the more "boomy" the sound may become, and the further away you get, the "thinner" the sound may become. Try and try again.

What about the other end of the guitar? With the body tones captured, we can now look at picking up the string tones.

Positioning a microphone at the bridge of the acoustic guitar, facing in toward the fretboard, can provide further detail and characteristics to your recording. With a microphone placed in this formation, you will be able to pick up the detail in the strings, the finger movement on the fret board when changing chords. This recorded sound, blended with the recorded sound of the body of the guitar, will give you an accurate and detailed representation of the acoustic guitar sound as it was being played. From a mixing perspective, you can pan one microphone signal to the left speaker, and the other to the right speaker, to give you a wider stereo image.

So... will it be string tones, fret tones, body tones, all of the above? You decide!
